Jane Schlabaugh was asked to lead the Task Force that would look at the pros and cons of a move or renovation during her time on the board. They began by looking at the Gilbert Court property Crowded Closet was in at the time and assessing that building, location, sales, growth, etc. Then, they formulated a list of priorities for a potential move and gathered financial information from other MCC Thrift Shops. They considered the financial results of moves other MCC shops had made in recent years. After much analysis, prayer and discernment, the Crowded Closet board, members of the Task Force and MCC Thrift representatives were all in agreement on a move if a suitable building could be found.

Chocolate Sour Cream Layer Cake 🏈

If you have ever been to a Crowded Closet pot luck, you know this cake! John Koch shares his secret recipe. See him for more details for recipe perfection.

Chocolate Sour Cream Laver Cake

CAKE 1 c flour 6 T cocoa $\frac{1}{2}$ t salt ¹/₄ t baking soda 10 T butter 1 c + 2 T sugar1 t vanilla 2 eggs $\frac{1}{2}$ c sour cream

FROSTING

2 t instant coffee powder $1\frac{1}{2}$ t hot water 1 c + 2 T sour cream 10 oz. semisweet chocolate

For cake: Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease two round cake pans. Sift first 5 ingredients. Beat butter until fluffy. Gradually add sugar, vanilla, and eggs. Add dry ingredients alternately with sour cream until just blended. Divide batter between cake pans. Bake about 25 mins. Cool 5 mins in pans, then turn out onto racks and cool completely.

For frosting: Dissolve coffee powder in hot water. Add sour cream and blend. Melt chocolate in double boiler until smooth. Add sour cream mixture to chocolate and blend.

Place 1 cake on platter and spread ¹/₂ c frosting over. Top with second cake layer, and spread top and sides with remaining frosting. Can be prepared 8 hours ahead. Cover and let stand at room temperature.
